I immediately responded to this interest by working with my school to establish a Kids Helping Kids club. This was no easy feat, but despite what I had to overcome, the club is now official.

Now, in my senior year of college, I am serving as the Kids Helping Kids college and high school coordinator. One of KHK's current goals is to branch out to other schools – both high schools and colleges – and I am helping to facilitate that goal.

What could be more terrifying than being awoken and finding your house engulfed in flames? When Kenya Wright found herself in that horrifying situation, she had to do something few of us could possibly imagine – she had to jump out her window to save her life. In doing so, she sustained a spinal chord injury. Now confined to a wheelchair, Kenya needs a ramp to get into her house, but her family had no money to pay for it. That's where we came in. Kids Helping Kids bought Kenya a portable ramp and now she can work on putting her life back together.



Stefan Henry, 14

Stefan has a very positive attitude about life. Even though a car accident made him a quadriplegic, he maintains a great outlook. He lives in a small house with a small lawn. When we first talked to Stefan and his family, we talked about giving him a ramp, but that would have taken up the entire lawn and there are other kids in the family. So we decided to wait a little longer, raise some more money and instead, got Stefan a porchlift, which takes up much less room. Stefan is very grateful to the many volunteers who contributed to this much more costly solution, and he wants everyone to know how dramatically it has changed his life forever.

“Friday Night Fever” Brings Our Mission to Life

Another on-going activity our volunteers have been enjoying is Friday Night Fever with the kids at Children's Specialized. Every Friday Night Fever event is a different adventure – a trip to the mall, the Haunted Trail on Halloween etc. These are great opportunities for our volunteers to provide companionship to the kids who've been affected by catastrophic illness or injury.

Sarah Jameison, now 17 years old, had never been just your basic teenager. Gifted with an extraordinary voice, Sarah loved to sing and had taken singing lessons for many years. But one terrible day in 2003, she was in a terrible car accident that left her with severe brain injuries. After spending many months in the Weisman Children's Rehabilitation Hospital, Sarah went home, but she went home changed. The accident left her with severe weakness in the nerve controlling vocal chord motion. She could no longer sing in the same way as before. When KHK heard this, we decided that helping give Sarah back what was so much a part of her life before, would be very much true to our mission, so we funded six months of voice lessons for Sarah...a wonderful gift for a wonderfully talented teen.

The National Association Of Social Workers Conference Spreads Awareness

Molly Zimmermann and Simone Calbi, founding members and veterans of KHK hospital visits – among so many other events – had the extraordinary opportunity to attend the National Association of Social Workers Conference in Atlantic City to represent Kids Helping Kids. They set up a KHK booth and presented to Social Workers, counselors, teachers etc., explaining what Kids Helping Kids can do for their clients. The response was tremendous and the girls were able to make connections with professionals from agencies that we are certain to work with in the future. The importance of helping social workers, child life specialists, discharge personnel etc. understand how important Kids Helping Kids can be to a child or teen who is moving back into a life that is completely different than the one he or she knew, is critical. Molly and Simone were able to present our mission of being there when funds and insurance aren't, to provide the mobility equipment to get kids back into the world of their peers. More than one comment was overheard about them as well, alluding to how impressive our two presenters were, "restoring people's faith in the youth of America."

Corporate Presentation, Learning To Raise Funds

This year, a number of the volunteers – with Mischa at the helm – had the chance to participate in a high level presentation to Manny and Andrea Schragger, owners of the Meadowlands Consumer Center. Their goal was to present the attributes of Kids Helping Kids in a formal way in the company's boardroom, using a PowerPoint presentation to help raise funds for KHK in a corporate setting. This was designed to be a run-through, but was taken very seriously with many rehearsals beforehand – many thanks to Mr. Clifford for all his time and guidance. The actual pitch was videotaped and critiqued. With a lot of excellent input by the Schraggers, who do this type of coaching for a living, the volunteer team did an excellent job presenting the organization and received invaluable feedback for improving even further. Our volunteers were overwhelmed with what they learned from an almost real-world experience. Lizzy Star said, "The presentation was an eye-opening experience. I never really knew how much work goes into a pitch to a potential corporate sponsor. Before the presentation, we worked hard composing what we wanted to say, but it's always more difficult to present in a boardroom than in a low-pressure practice situation. Luckily, Mr. and Mrs. Schragger were the perfect audience: they gave helpful, detailed suggestions on how to improve our presentation. These suggestions will help KHK perform successful pitches in the future and will also help each individual presenter, myself included, with any sort of public speaking we will ever encounter." Michael Rey, now a Senior at Harvard noted, "It was amazing to go in front of a corporation and present our ideas. It really made me feel like we were a professional organization- not just a bunch of kids anymore. Everyone did their part, and we all listened to and learned from each other. Overall, I think that giving this presentation took Kids Helping Kids to a new level."
